Surabhi Ranganathan is Associate Professor of International Law at the University of Cambridge, a Deputy Director of the Lauterpacht Centre for International Law and a Fellow and Director of Studies in Law at King's College. She is also a fellow of the Cambridge Centre for Environment, Energy and Natural Resource Governance (C-EENRG). Her research explores histories and politics of international law, with a current focus on the designation, representations and regulation of global commons, especially the deep seabed.
