

## **16th call for the SNSF Professorships: 40 awards for 2015**

The 16th call for the SNSF Professorships attracted 254 applications from scientists in spring 2014.

August 2014 saw the completion of the first part of the procedure, after which 75 candidates were invited to submit a detailed application. 67 persons presented their project in January 2015 to the evaluation committees of the National Research Council. For the second stage of the evaluation, the Council additionally called upon the assistance of external experts.

The Swiss National Science Foundation has now awarded 40 SNSF Professorships to promising young researchers who have proved to be of exceptional scientific ability. The final selection also placed particular emphasis upon the candidates' suitability and commitment to teaching.

SNSF professorships places very high demands on the candidates. Unfortunately, due to the limited number of awards that can be granted by the SNSF, even highly qualified candidates could not always be taken into consideration.

Since 2009, the Research Council applies a separate set of conditions to evaluate research proposals in clinically oriented areas. In 2015, 4 of the 13 grants in biology and medicine were awarded to clinical researchers.

The proportion of researchers abroad who will return with an SNSF professorship to Switzerland in 2015 is 30%. "Brain gain" thus continues to be an important aim of the funding scheme.

The share of women who received an SNSF professorship in 2015 is 35% (2014: 45%). After 16 calls for proposals, 29.6% of all successful SNSF professorship applicants were female. This means that the targeted overall share of women grantees (30% across all cohorts) has almost been achieved in the timeframe 2000-2015. The SNSF will continue its efforts to increase the proportion of female SNSF professorship grantees in the next years.

The new SNSF professors will be working in 8 Swiss Universities and both Federal Institutes of Technology. They will be active in research, teaching and clinical work and will enjoy the status of an assistant professor or equivalent. The SNSF thereby provides them with a strong foundation for their future careers.
